## Truck Tragedy in La Honda

On October 12 at 8:45 a.m. a truck driver was killed when his fully loaded cement truck overturned near the water tanks at the top of Roquena Drive in **La Honda**. Fred Eisenstaedt, the driver, was 62 years old.



The truck from GraniteRock was delivering 9 yards of concrete for the final pour of a house. As the driver approached on Esmerelda Terrace, the construction workers offered to help guide him with hand signals around the last hairpin turn over Woodhams Creek. The driver waved them off. He had years of experience and had delivered to this same project on earlier pours.

Making the turn, tire tracks indicate that the rear wheels went off the pavement onto the soft shoulder of the road. The barrel of the truck was still mixing, which may have shifted the load off center. Nobody witnessed the actual collapse, but apparently the truck slid sideways and backward into the canyon of the creek. The cab flipped. The force of 30,000 pounds of concrete falling into a canyon flattened the cab as if it had been put through a crusher. *(continued on page 2)*

## Thomas Klingele Killed After Striking Deer on Motorcycle in San Gregorio

"A 50-year-old motorcyclist from **La Honda** [some reports say Moss Beach] died after colliding with a deer on state Highway 84 in San Gregorio on Monday evening. The motorcyclist, Thomas Klingele, was found east of Stage Road, according to the California Highway Patrol. Klingele was heading west on Highway 84 at an unknown speed on a 2011 Honda motorcycle when a deer entered the motorcycle's path from the south. .. Klingele, who was thrown from the motorcycle, managed to return to the roadway... ## Thomas Christopher Klingele



"Thomas Christopher Klingele's name was written in the Book of Life on Oct. 24, 1960, and was called home Monday, Oct. 17, 2011. Tom, also known as "Tommy," was killed in a

motorcycle accident on Highway 84 on his way to a meeting in Pescadero, Calif. He was 50 years old. Thomas, born and raised in California and youngest of five children, is preceded in death by his father, Eugene Henry Klingele, his sister Judith Marie Morris-Preston, and his brother Kevin Edward Klingele. He is loved, remembered, and survived by his mother Ruth Ann Klingele, his eldest brother Herbert Eugene Thomas Klingele, his brother John Robert Klingele, and his children Christopher Thomas Klingele, Crystal Necole Klingele and stepdaughter Kelly Barker. He is also survived by five grandchildren and will be missed by all who loved him. Tom loved to work and also loved the outdoors. When he wasn't chopping firewood, maintaining the family trailer park, attending meetings or visiting with family, he spent time hiking in the woods and driving up and down the California coastline. After a lifetime of struggle with drugs and alcohol, Tom died after spending two years clean and sober. He was proud to be at a point in his recovery where he was helping others deal with their addictions." His funeral services occurred on Oct. 28, at Our Lady of Refuge in La Honda.

Joseph Kral of the La Honda Fire Brigade, who lives just above the accident scene, heard it take

place. A veteran of many accident calls, Kral was first to respond. The cab was so flattened that the driver could not be seen. With the help of two tow trucks, it took the entire day and into the night to get the driver's body out of there.

Roquena and Esmerelda are private roads owned and maintained by the Cuesta La Honda Guild. The truck itself was separated from its mixer barrel and was removed the following day. The barrel containing 9 yards of hardening concrete was left behind, to be removed later by a crane.



Many construction workers in the La Honda area were familiar with Fred Eisenstaedt, the driver. Sometimes he brought his terrier dog along with him on deliveries. Apparently not this time.

Lawyers and insurance companies will argue over who was at fault. Meanwhile, a man is gone.

Be careful out there.

### **First Nationwide Test of Emergency Alert System Wednesday, November 9**

"San Mateo County residents watching television or listening to the radio on the morning of Wednesday, November 9, will hear the first-ever nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System.

The 11 a.m. test will provide local, state and federal authorities the opportunity to ensure vital safety information can be communicated from the nation's capital to the public via television and radio broadcasters and cable operators.

No action will be needed on the part of the public. The test will look very much like standard emergency alerts and will begin with three tones and the words, "This is a test.' "

He was most impressed by the way David Grisman played. As many musicians these days, Mark has a wide spectrum of styles he likes to play. He started mostly with blues-rock with his first band the Cheap Blues Review. The first time I saw Mark perform it was with his wife Monica in the awesome duo Mark and Monica. Once Mark started working at the San Mateo Outdoor Education program, he met several other naturalists that liked to play music. They never really planned to be a professional band, but things seemed to click. Their director funded their first of many albums and 26 years later the Banana Slug String Band is still one of the foremost children's bands in the world. ### Crows and Ravens in La Honda

The other early morning I heard a strange guttural sound coming from way up a redwood tree. The light was so dim that that it took me a while to see the source of the sound, and even then I had to watch long enough that I really could see the mouth of this big raven open each time I heard the two-tone "EE-YONK"! It reminded me of a didgeridoo or of some gigantic creature's stomach growling. Soon the raven was joined by nearly a dozen others and

the sky was filled with the raucous sound of these marauding pirates.

Crows and ravens have become more common in **La Honda**, as in much of the country, and I think it's safe to say that most of us consider them annoyances. They are opportunistic omnivores and have been able to take advantage of our human settlements much more than some more discriminating birds. They have a strong family structure, which may contribute to their success.

There are all kinds of stories of pet crows, of crows which can recognize human voices, and there is even a story on Wikipedia of someone wanting to train crows to use vending machines as a reward for picking up trash! Roman naturalist Pliny notes how the ancient Greeks cherished "jackdaws" (another name for crows) for destroying grasshoppers' eggs.

Crows are a part of our human psyche - the raven representing the trickster, not just among our northwest native tribes, but also among the aboriginal tribes of Australia. People in the Middle East dread crows because they eat dead things. We use the phrase, "As the crow flies..." to describe the straightest distance to somewhere. And then, there's the famous, if inscrutable, "Quoth the raven, 'Nevermore!'" "by Edgar Allan Poe.

I will leave it to someone else to discuss what to do about crows and ravens...meanwhile I hope to get another chance to hear that great big harrumph in the sky.

## Mountain Biking in La Honda

Mountain biking in **La Honda** is an easy, quick, and fun way to exercise. The only problem is that riders have a hard time finding trails that suit their wants. It all depends on what type of trails you like to ride, also whether it's single track or group trails.



Group trails are trails that are shared by pedestrians and/or horseback riders. These trails are typically slow and an easy ride, while riding single-track trails are more for riders who like technical terrain, or more serious hikers. These trails may consist of switchbacks, log drops, and bridge crossings. Trails like these are for better riders or riders looking for a thrill!

The most relaxed group trail in the **La Honda** region would be the Swing Trail; this trail is a slow, easy slope. If you are riding just to get some fresh air, it's a good 20-minute ride. Off this trail was actually an old shooting range back in the early 1900's. If you feel like being spontaneous, then feel free to cut off the trail and ride one of the side trails. But be careful because some of these side trails lead to people's yards.

The Roquena trail is probably the most technical and challenging trail there is in La Honda. This trail is a single-track trail. If you are thinking of riding this trail; you should probably be comfortable with your riding abilities. Part of this trail actually used to be an old logging road leading to what now are called the reservoirs. This road was active back in the day when La Honda was booming with logging companies and logging roads. Now that these roads have been out of use, there are many opportunities to find new and exciting trails.

Keep in mind that the two trails I have mentioned take a lot of exercise just to access these trailheads. The only thing that you need to absolutely know is where the trails start and end, because you definitely don't want to end up going up the trails when you intended to go down them.

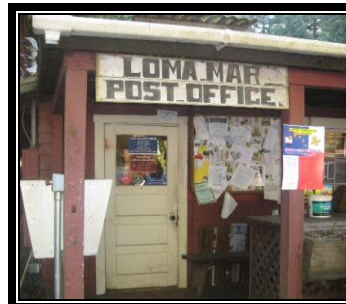
My advice to any new, inexperienced riders is to keep a level head and don't ride outside your limits. If you feel like pushing those limits, you should probably ride with someone else. This will help you in case of an emergency, because trails like these are very remote from any house or medics. Another thing, before I go, is always wear a helmet. I know that might sound "un-cool" or "lame," but when you're lying in the hospital bed with a broken head, it'll change your mind drastically!

## Local Post Office Closures

Local post offices, including the Loma Mar and San Gregorio stations, have found themselves on a list of about three thousand post offices, all facing the possibility of closure. For about two hundred years, post offices in the U.S. have been the heart of communities. But in the last five years, mail volume has decreased by more than 20% because fewer people are buying stamps and supporting their local post offices.



Only two years ago, in 2009, the postal service lost \$3.9 billion dollars. Last year, it lost \$8.5 billion dollars, as it competed with companies like Federal Express (*continued on next page*)

**Post Office Closures** (from previous page) and alternate communication through the Internet. Because of those losses, the Postal Service is closing the smaller post offices that are causing them to lose more than they gain.

“The Postal Service of the future will be smaller, leaner, and more competitive, and it will continue to serve commerce, communities, and deliver value,” said Danahoe, US Postmaster General. The Postal Service is also planning on stopping service on Saturdays, an idea that could save \$3 billion annually.

The Postal Service admits there will be job losses due to the closings. Donahoe stated that, “We are losing revenue as we speak,” and “We do not want taxpayer money. We want to be self-sufficient. So, like any other business, you have to make choices.” But this does not stop the fact that about three thousand postmasters, five hundred supervisors, and about five hundred to one thousand clerks will all lose their jobs.

Each post office facing closure was notified by the Postal Service that they would begin a pre-proposal stage, this way they will be able to review the whole site. According to the USPS, no decision will be made on a post office until after December. When a post office is put under consideration, it will be given a 60-day proposal period where the USPS will have community meetings to discuss locals thoughts and feelings towards the closure. In Loma Mar, many of the community gathered together and tried to save the local post office, even though everyone knows we have no hope.

Even though Loma Mar and San Gregorio are only two of the many post offices in the U.S. being closed, it still will have a large effect on each community that use the privileges of the local post office. “Closing our post office does not make sense,” Chris Brancart stated, “It will hurt business, the environment, and our community, and not save much money at all. Loma Mar loses a lot and the government gains very little. Crazy.”

## Medicare Changes in 2012 & Supplemental Health Insurance Options Explained

The meeting will take place at the Puente Office in Downtown La Honda and is sponsored by the **La Honda 55+ Program**. HICAP, an information and counseling service, is supported by the local Agency on Aging. They do not represent or advocate for particular insurance or healthcare entities and appointments with HICAP Counselors are typically made through senior centers. more likely to be the reason the firehouse bell rings.

A joyride destination, La Honda sees hundreds of bikers pass through town on any sunny day. And whenever any of those two-wheeled visitors runs off the road or crashes, the La Honda fire squad comes to the rescue. It's no small job - the La Honda brigade covers 51 miles of prime motorcycling roads that commonly generate a few accidents on any fair-weather day.

Sunday, it was the motorcyclists rescuing the firefighters. Now in its eighth year, an event dubbed "La Ducati Day" drew hundreds of bikers to La Honda to raise funds for the rural fire station...money each year goes to help pay for fire trucks, supplies and other expenses for the fire brigade. This year, the event proceeds would help pay for a new \$30,000 roof on the La Honda Fire Station, which is currently "leaking like a sieve," said Steve Krause, the brigade's board president.

On Sunday, at the town garden, **La Honda** townsfolk were outnumbered by bikers, many of them in brightly colored riding suits seemingly out of the space age. The event's name is a tribute to the Italian motorcycle brand, but the event drew the full spectrum of motorcycle makes, such as Kawasaki, Honda, BMW and Harley-Davidson...."

"Visitors to the Pigeon Point Lighthouse who return each year for the annual mid-November lens lighting will have to stay home this year... The 2011 event was cancelled because the lens needs to be moved before the lighthouse restoration can begin...the lighthouse built in 1871 has been in need of restoration since 2001...The entire restoration is estimated to cost nine to ten million dollars and could take up to five years to complete, the history association notes.

## Meet the Sticklebacks!

Who knew they were swimming in our lagoon? Amy knew. Local fish biologist Amy Haas led a number of intrepid souls on a journey into the San Gregorio lagoon recently to discover the life within. The lagoon, or estuary, is an incredibly complex system. The mixing of salt and fresh water forms a unique environment, with varying temperatures and water quality conditions vital to a number of species. Amy introduced us to several of these including the Tidewater Goby, Three-spined Stickleback, Steelhead Trout and Coho Salmon.



In addition to describing the life cycle and needs of these fish, Amy answered many questions, and provided beautiful color handouts with photographs for aquatic species identification. Amy then led the group into the water with snorkel gear to have a look around. The first observation was how cold the water was!

We also learned how important it is for the lagoon environment to be protected. When the mixture of salt and fresh water or temperatures are artificially altered, an entire season of a particular species can be wiped out. Ocean waves build up the sandbar that partially separates the salt and fresh water, and also tears it down at other times to allow this natural connection between stream system and ocean. Artificial breaching of the sandbar can have disastrous effects on the species in and around the lagoon.

## Lack of Subsidy could Mean Trash Trouble in Pescadero

"There was a time when rural residents of Pescadero, lacking anywhere to dump their garbage, would just dig a hole and toss it in. Those days could return, locals fear, if the county decides to close the town's transfer station -- the only place for thousands of South Coast residents to

bring their trash, recycling and household junk. Operated by Republic Services, the transfer station runs a \$15,000 monthly deficit despite a generous monthly subsidy from the county...Now that subsidy is going away because the county is canceling its Solid Waste Fund. As of August 2012, locals will face astronomical rate hikes unless someone can find a way to make up the difference...By some estimates, more than 1,000 other South Coast residents -- from the wilds south of Half Moon Bay down the coast to Davenport, from **La Honda** up to Skyline Boulevard -- all use the transfer station somewhat regularly..."

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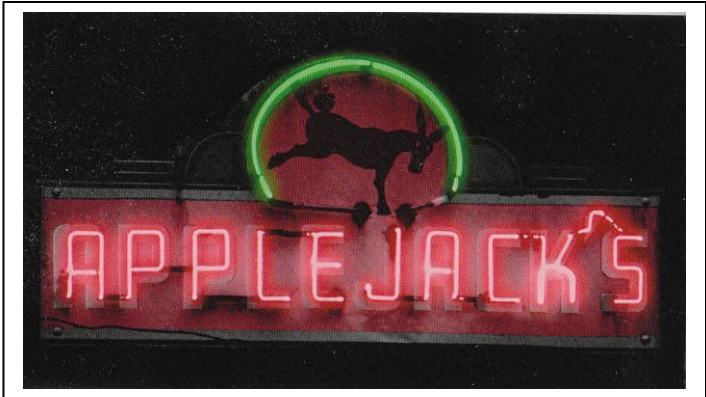


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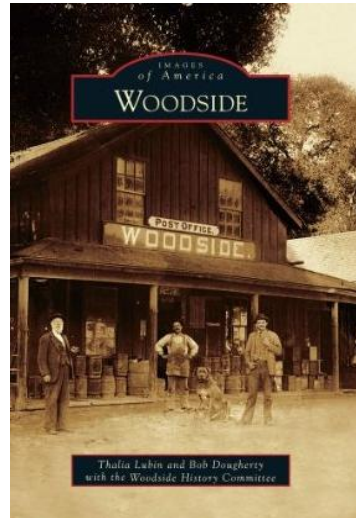
